CAMPAIGN OFFENCES IN AFRICA

The existence and enforcement of petty offences in Sierra Leone most affects the **poor** and **marginalised**

50% of suspects accused of petty offences are petty traders









The existence and enforcement of petty offences in Sierra Leone has a **greater impact** on **women** than men

40% of offences recorded for female suspects were **petty offences** in contrast to that of 32% for male suspects









Why the offence of loitering requires decriminalisation:

Key elements of the offence are imprecise and undefined

Gives police power to legally arrest any person irrespective of if they are a threat to public order or security









Why the offence of loitering requires decriminalisation:

No empirical **evidence** that it achieves objective of promoting public order and security

It is **impossible** to know with any certainty how to avoid committing the crime









Why the offence of non-payment of debt requires decriminalisation:

Criminalising debt **contributes**to the **overcrowding** of
correctional centres

Violates human rights standards and does not comply with Sierra Leone constitution









Why the offence of non-payment of debt requires decriminalisation:

The offence **disproportionately** affects those who are **poor** and constitutes indirect discrimination

Criminalises pure **debt** situations that are non-violent, where **no** fraudulent intention exists









Reasons why the offence of insulting conduct requires decriminalisation:

Suppression of freedom of expression might in extreme cases lead to **civil discontent**

Key elements of the offence are vague and open to subjective interpretation and application









Reasons why the offence of insulting conduct requires decriminalisation:

Violates human rights standards and does **not comply** with Sierra Leone constitution

The right to express criticism and to offend is **needed** to allow change to come about in society
